




Free trade zone initiatives in the Asia-Pacific

• ORight now a second round of the negotiations is on-going in Tokyo.


A Tax Convention between Japan and Portugal

 O A Tax Convention to Avoid Double Taxation and to Prevent Fiscal Evasion in Japan and Portugal was signed at the end of 2011.


 O Following Portuguese Parliament's approval, Japan's Diet gave the green light to the Convention last week.
